CIVIC - Civility

Civility encourages open-mindedness to face disagreements with others. Addressing differences with heart and curiosity is a critical skill to teach civility.

To teach civility consider developing a set of norms for students to follow when faced with differing opinions or perspectives. The following suggestions are adapted from Doing Good Together.

- 1. Begin with behavior that highlights mutual respect: eye contact, take turns speaking, one person speaks at a time.
- 2. Encourage children to begin again when their tone changes to nagging, bullying or disrespect.
- 3. Encourage using I statements and model ways to encourage curiosity for another's perspective. For example: Tell me more about that, What do you think about ____? For example: Tell me more about that, What do you think about...?
- 4. Learn to be okay with being wrong.
- 5. Ask questions and listen to understand another person's point of view.

Developing a set of norms to encourage and practice conversational emapthy and cuirosity will ultimately help us have more meaningful and respectful conversations.
